Christian Aid Week began this year on May 13th with the Sunday evening service, held at St. Mary's Church in Bures. The speaker was Rev. Ruth Ridge and representatives from several local churches took part. Over the week, 60 people collected door-to-door in Sudbury and Great Cornard. The total collected was £4,354.32. Several roads were again not covered. It would be good to have more collectors to replace those who are no longer able to collect door-to-door.

On August 1st, another very successful sponsored canoe trip down the River Stour was organised to raise money for Christian Aid. Ten people, including Simon Snell (Regional Coordinator for Suffolk Christian Aid), paddled from Wissington to Stratford St. Mary on a beautiful summer's day. So far, generous

sponsors have contributed £2,200, which will be enhanced by an amazing 17:1 matched funding. This means that every £1 raised will be turned into £18! The event this year was to raise money for a Christian Aid project in Kenya, supporting children and orphans affected by HIV/AIDS.

As John and I will be moving away from Sudbury next summer (2019), a new Local Organiser is urgently needed. Please think carefully and prayerfully whether you, or anyone you know, might be able to take on the role. I or Malcolm Snow can supply more information about what is involved in this very worthwhile task. It would be good if a replacement Local Organiser could work alongside me for Christian Aid Week in 2019.

Christian Aid works on behalf of British churches in more than 40 countries, not only providing emergency relief, but, more importantly, supporting long term development.

Eden's

We're sure you will have seen the news that we are fundraising this year to try and buy the buildings that Eden's has been operating out of for the last 19 years. This has obviously taken up a lot of our attention and time but we have also been continuing with all our usual activities whilst doing this. So far for the building fund we have raised £24,000 of the £160,000 needed to be able to buy the buildings and carry out essential repairs to the buildings. We are really grateful to all of you who have supported us so far and we would continue to ask for your prayers for success from some of the many grant bids we have submitted. We would also really appreciate it if you could encourage your

churches to consider supporting us with an extra donation this year which we could put towards the building fund.

So amongst all this fundraising we have continued to run the evening youth clubs in Great Cornard, Glemsford and Sudbury and the after-school drop-in at Sudbury also. We have again been involved with the Prayer space at Thomas Gainsborough School orgainsed by future vision which was a real privilege to help the students take some time out of the busy school day to think and consider things they may not usually give any time to. We were very pleased to have enough interest this year to be able to run a second 'Understanding your Teenagers' course which uses the material from the Care for the Family Time out for Parents Teenagers course. The seven week course was extremely well received and the parents gave really good feedback saying that they had gained a lot from it.

We continue to hold our evangelistic dinner nights at the end of each term which give us the opportunity to share the gospel with the young people who choose to attend. We are really pleased that the Sunday night youth café which developed out of the evening Agape café has also continued strongly this year and is building in numbers. It is a really great support for the Christian teenagers of the town to meet together and have fun with each other whilst also supporting each other in what can be a challenging time of life to be a Christian. A couple of them have also brought friends along who are just wanting to find out about the Christian faith and it has been really encouraging to see them become part of the group and consider their beliefs.

Fairtrade report

In December 2017 we decorated a Christmas tree in St Peter's with the message "Fairtrade Brexit with Hope". We encouraged the public to write to our MP to ask him to persuade the government to consider the poverty of producers in poorer countries when negotiating Brexit and post-Brexit deals eg to call for a duty-free, quota - free market access scheme and to consider the impact of all trade deals on poorer countries.

The group was busy during Fairtrade Fortnight. There was a very successful coffee morning with the theme "Come on in to Fairtrade." The group had a photo

with the Mayor of Sudbury at the Town Hall, showing the important support of the Council for Fairtrade. There were other Fairtrade activities across Sudbury at Tudor Primary School and Sudbury Beavers.

The Fairtrade group has met regularly. The group has kept in touch with SAFT [http://www.suffolkfairtrade.org.uk/]. Members will be attending the national Fairtrade conference at the L.S.E. in October. New members who support Fairtrade are very welcome.

Fellowship Football

The 2018/19 season kicks off on 24^{th} September and runs through until the beginning of July 2019.

This year, we have seven teams taking part. Two of them represent Churches Together, two represent Number 72, in addition there are teams representing Eden's, Fellowship Snooker and Rougham Baptist Church.

At our recent AGM, Mark Gillett (who runs one of the Churches Together teams), was formally adopted as the league's Chairperson.

After running a team for 12 season's in total, Paul Tamsett has decided that the time has come for him relinquish the 'hurly burly' of team management. This season Paul will be focusing on administrative duties as the League's Secretary.

Sadly there wasn't anybody available to take over from Paul, who previously ran the Vineyard's football team, and so their players have all joined up with one of Number 72's teams.

Our values are modelled upon the teachings of Jesus, which are foundational to Fellowship Football. In the main, players like the fact that we play without referees: everyone being encouraged to play honestly and to place a higher value on friendship and fellowship, rather than upon our desire to win. Foul language is frowned upon.

The vast majority of those who take part are not Christians, yet every week, the players respond positively, as they listen to a brief talk where we outline the league's ethics. We carefully explain that, whilst we strive for the highest

standards in our own personal conduct, it is quite unrealistic to expect perfection from anyone in these things. After all, we are all flawed human beings, who sometimes let both ourselves and each other down. We all need Jesus.

Since our inception, with regards to the players behaviour, I can honestly say that last season was the best ever. Last season we introduced Team Leader training sessions, to equip non-church players who would like to deepen their involvement. The sessions take the players a little deeper in their understanding of the Christian Faith - which is something they will need if they want to run their own teams.

Every season we hold two social events, which contains some spiritual content. This season, these will be overseen by Stuart Ayling. We were greatly encouraged at our last event which we held in April, when forty of the players came to our Soul Cafe. The event was held in a local Indian restaurant and at the end, a short talk was given by Shaun Almond who shared his Christian faith. This too was well received.

We are currently on the look out for a League Chaplain. The role of Christian team leaders is quite demanding. Typical duties include - organising players, washing kit, collecting match fees etc. If we're not careful, these activities can absorb our energies and limit the time that we are able to devote to ministering to the players.

We would really value the support of someone with a deep love of the Lord, who has a passion for football and who could devote themselves to a league chaplaincy role. The person we are looking for should -

Be sociable and the enjoy the company of the players,
Be available most Monday evenings to watch the lads play, get to know
them, and when appropriate, provide counsel, and perhaps pray with them.
Be able to deliver a one minute pre-match talk, explaining to the players
how the teaching of Jesus affects the league.

Lead a monthly small group which has a Christian focus.

If you know anyone who might fit the bill, please could you let me know. We especially value the support and goodwill of Churches Together. We see ourselves as just one part of the outreach work of the church in Sudbury and District.

Once again over this last year we are grateful to God for his presence and guidance in all that we do at Future Vision. Open the Book takes place in 11 primary schools. 1,000 + children get to hear the great Bible stories we know and love on a regular basis and to reflect on their meaning.

These assemblies are led by Lesley Mitchell, Debbie Steed and Ruth Ridge.

N. Vision Clubs are different in each school. 1 school has a Film Club where they watch a small piece of film and then discuss an issue that emerges from what they have seen. Others are a safe space to talk and ask questions about faith and life alongside crafts and games.

Increasingly we are seeing the need to provide a 'chaplaincy' style opportunity in Primary schools. In one school Lesley has been given a space and has set up an area for children to go and talk, or hang tags for feelings, prayers and questions. She has the whole morning in school on Mondays. Please pray for this 'sacred space' and for Lesley.

Prayer Spaces

Bures Primary and Gt. Waldingfield have held Prayer Space days with opportunities for children to engage with activities and to reflect.

Alongside this they are involved in a variety of lessons, personal one to ones, working with staff [not just teaching but cleaners etc] and fortnightly drop in sessions for staff.

All of this is a big undertaking for 5 workers and their teams of volunteers and much more could be done.

Our Management group and the Trustees are meeting at the end of September to pray and reflect on the way forward for the coming school year. There is much to do but we need to be sure we are following God's leading. We would value your prayers for us as we seek God together.

Being on my own with this was a challenge so I dismantled all except the tree and snake and asked the children to guess the bible story, some could, whilst others needed a bit of help.

We had two activities; one was scratch art, which allows the children to take a piece of black card and scratch it with a special tool to reveal rainbow colours underneath. The children thought of things that make the world a better place and scratched either words or pictures which they either kept or hung around

The second activity was taking a luggage tag and writing a prayer or message to God and then hanging them around the gazebo. We had about 30 of these, either names or messages.

We had a few families coming in and cgot a chance to talk to some of the parents and carers about the work of Future Vision. I also had a lovely chat with some ladies from the childrens' centre, who were impressed with the work we do and who talked about story telling for tots.

We are often so encouraged to know, that there are many people who think of, and are praying for the Town Pastor team, when the Town Pastors are on the streets of Sudbury on a Saturday night from 10pm to 3am.

Of the many trials the apostle Paul faced, reiterating that his trust was in God, he writes to the church at Corinth that he believed it was often as a result of, "....as you help us by your prayers. Then many will give thanks on our behalf for the gracious favour granted us in answer to the prayers of many"

As we look back over the past year, there have been many times when we have seen real answers to prayer on the streets, and the gracious hand of God has been with us as we've sought to minister to those we meet. So thank you for thinking of us, and praying for us.

(One of our Town Pastors, who moved to Cornwall in the earlier part of this year, was miraculously recovered, unconscious, from the sea, and survived. So can we not claim divine intervention at sea as well as on the streets?!)

As in most years, there have been changes to our team for different reasons. Please pray with us, for more people to become involved in such a wonderful opportunity to reach out to those in our town community, whose only contact with Christians, will often be with the Town Pastors.

It is humbling to speak with our Home Pray-ers, and learn of their commitment to praying during their one hour slot, (usually one hour a month). It can be costly, waking sometimes in the early hours of the morning, in order to phone in to Prayer Base, standing with the Town Pastors through prayer. We are so grateful to our prayer team.

Our ultimate desire(and we constantly seek openings in our many conversations), is to point those we meet on the streets, to Jesus.

There are some weekends of the year, when it seems interest in alcohol is little diminished from previous years. Freddos and bottles of water, together with kindness and love and a listening ear, are our means of entry in ministry. But it is also very alarming to us, witnessing the evidence of an increase in alcohol/drug/substance abuse. We can but ask God to intervene, and do all we can to work towards showing that there is a better way to live.

Sunday 16th October is Town pastor Sunday, so there may be local radio broadcasts seeking to raise awareness, and the profile of Town Pastors county wide.

At present in Sudbury, there are 9 Town Pastors, and a total team of 42.

CTiS&D 18-35s Task Group

CTiS&D committees can suggest projects, and if approved at a Forum, can facilitate them. But progress, whether for Kettle & Fish, Town Pastors, Fellowship Football & Snooker, Advent Trail etc., depends on active participation and prayer support from member churches.

Reaching young, particularly single, over 18s is a real challenge. From the CofE perspective, Revd Dave Gardner, St Edmundsbury Director of Mission, wrote recently "To be honest, we are starting from a very low base even with teenagers, let alone young adults". It's encouraging that some churches locally have increasing numbers of young children and parents, but bringing over-18 singles in 'from outside' remains a huge barrier for most.

This year our 18-35sTask Group has focused on the need for a safe, relaxed, accessible town environment where YPs who have perhaps already come into relationship with Christians through friendships or church outreach, can discuss life's questions. A sort of pre-Alpha experience, a step on the journey to discipleship and church membership. Some local groups already do this, but more is needed. It might be run in our local Costa, as that company supports Christian events. Shaun Almond, from Halstead but well known here, offers his input. There has been much discussion and consultation with ministers & groups, many of whom have welcomed it, but so far we have not found the necessary team to run it.

<u>Wanted</u>: a small group of keen Christians in their 20s, supported by church leaders and others. And the prayers of us all. Surely we must devote more resources to these precious young adults. One question is: can we achieve more together than separately?
